

RESPIRATORY CARE

The Respiratory Care program prepares students to enter a dynamic and progressive healthcare profession. Respiratory therapists work with advanced technology making it possible to help patients with respiratory and cardiac disorders.

The associate degree program in Respiratory Care provides hands-on education in diverse settings, including human patient simulation, adult and neonatal/pediatric critical care, emergency care, long-term care, pulmonary rehabilitation and diagnostic services.

Respiratory therapists are vital members of the healthcare team who work closely with physicians providing education and support to patients with acute and chronic cardiopulmonary disease for all ages from infants to the elderly.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE RESPIRATORY THERAPIST MAY INCLUDE:

- Interview and examine patients with breathing or cardiopulmonary disorders
- Consult with physicians about patients' conditions and developing treatment plans to determine appropriate therapy and treatment options
- Perform diagnostic testing
- Monitor and record patients' progress
- Administer medication and provide patient education
- Perform complex therapies including:
 - Mechanical ventilation
 - Performing and analyzing arterial blood gas
 - Airway clearance therapies

DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM, LICENSURE AND ACCREDITATION

The Respiratory Care program meets the state education requirements for a Respiratory Care Practitioner license in the State of Connecticut and is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Respiratory Care.

Students who successfully complete the Respiratory Care program are eligible to take the national credentialing examinations offered by the National Board for Respiratory Care.
